Treatment. Treatment of an eating disorder generally includes a team approach. The team typically includes primary care providers, mental health professionals and dietitians — all with experience in eating disorders. Treatment depends on your specific type of eating disorder.

Outpatient Eating Disorders Treatment. This type of treatment is the least restrictive level of care. Men and women participating in outpatient programs may see a nutritionist, therapist and other recovery professionals approximately 2-3 times per week.

Because eating disorder patients have a high rate of suicide, suicidality should also be closely monitored (Matusek & Wright, 2010). Whether working in an outpatient or inpatient treatment setting, clinicians working with eating disorders will make countless decisions regarding treatment interventions and the therapeutic process.

Types of eating disorders. The most common eating disorders are: anorexia nervosa - when you try to keep your weight as low as possible by not eating enough food, exercising too much, or both; bulimia - when you sometimes lose control and eat a lot of food in a very short amount of time (binging) and are then deliberately sick, use laxatives (medicine to help you poo), restrict what you ...

Research indicates that eating disorders very often go untreated. In one study (PDF, 382KB), for example, less than 13 percent of adolescents with eating disorders received treatment. But leaving eating disorders untreated can have serious consequences.

Types of Eating Disorder Treatment. The severity of the eating disorder and any co-occurring disorders will determine the initial treatment level you or your loved one should pursue, though it is typical to begin with the outpatient level.

Treatment plans for eating disorders include psychotherapy, medical care and monitoring, nutritional counseling, medications, or a combination of these approaches. Typical treatment goals include restoring adequate nutrition, bringing weight to a healthy level, reducing excessive exercise, and stopping binge-purge and binge-eating behaviors.
